Ambulant learner using the swing in motion/static	Ambulant Learner	Learner may fall by actively attempting to get off independently whilst swing is in motion/static causing impact injury to themselves.	Medium- 15	No Learner is to be left unattended whilst on the swing.  A safe and sensible pace/speed of swing should be used at all times. Stop swing immediately if necessary.  Learners encouraged to stay sitting or lying at all times. NO STANDING UP ON SWING  Follow any behaviour plans.  Ensure correct level of supervision is maintained at all times.		Low-5



No service of swing  Employees, Learners, third parties  A damaged or faulty swing my result in varying MSDs and impact injuries to users and operators from swing falling/coming away from frame and/or protruding /sharp/rough exposed parts causing bruises, cuts, abrasions to user and operator	Nest swing to be visually inspected fully before each use by staff. If damage or fault is apparent on any part of the swing, frame or other parts then staff must then immediately label swing as out of action and report to H&S team immediately.  Swing is inspected in line with all recommendations and serviced annually.  Swing included in monthly building audit
